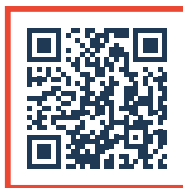

Treewell and Deep Snow Safety Info

Skiing and snowboarding off the groomed runs and in deep powder is one of the most exciting and appealing parts of our sport. However, if you decide to leave the groomed trails, you are voluntarily accepting the risk of a deep snow immersion accident. A deep snow or tree well immersion accident occurs when a skier or rider falls into an area of deep unconsolidated snow and becomes immobilized and suffocates. Deaths resulting from these kinds of accidents are referred to as an SIS hazard or Snow Immersion Suffocation.

Boundary Policy

Skiers or snowboarders going outside of marked area boundaries do so at their own risk. Areas outside of marked boundaries are not patrolled. Unmarked hazards of all types exist. Should you venture beyond the Ski Area Boundary you are accepting full responsibility for your actions. Any rescue necessary is at your own expense. Please know emergency response is coordinated by Mineral County, Montana, or Shoshone County, Idaho Sheriff department. You or your heirs will be financially responsible for this service. Response could be 48 hours out. Be prepared!

Skiers and riders should be advised a Green Circle, Blue Square, Black Diamond or Double Black Diamond trail at one ski area or mountain at Lookout Pass is not necessarily the same as a similarly rated trail at another ski area or mountain at Lookout Pass. Skiers and riders should work their way up, beginning with the easiest trails, no matter what their ability level may be, until they are familiar with the trails of Lookout Pass.

Be advised that all fencing, equipment covers, signage, ropes, ribbons and other marking devices are in place to inform you and to indicate a potential obstacle or hazard. These markers will not protect you from injury. It is your responsibility to stay away from marked areas.

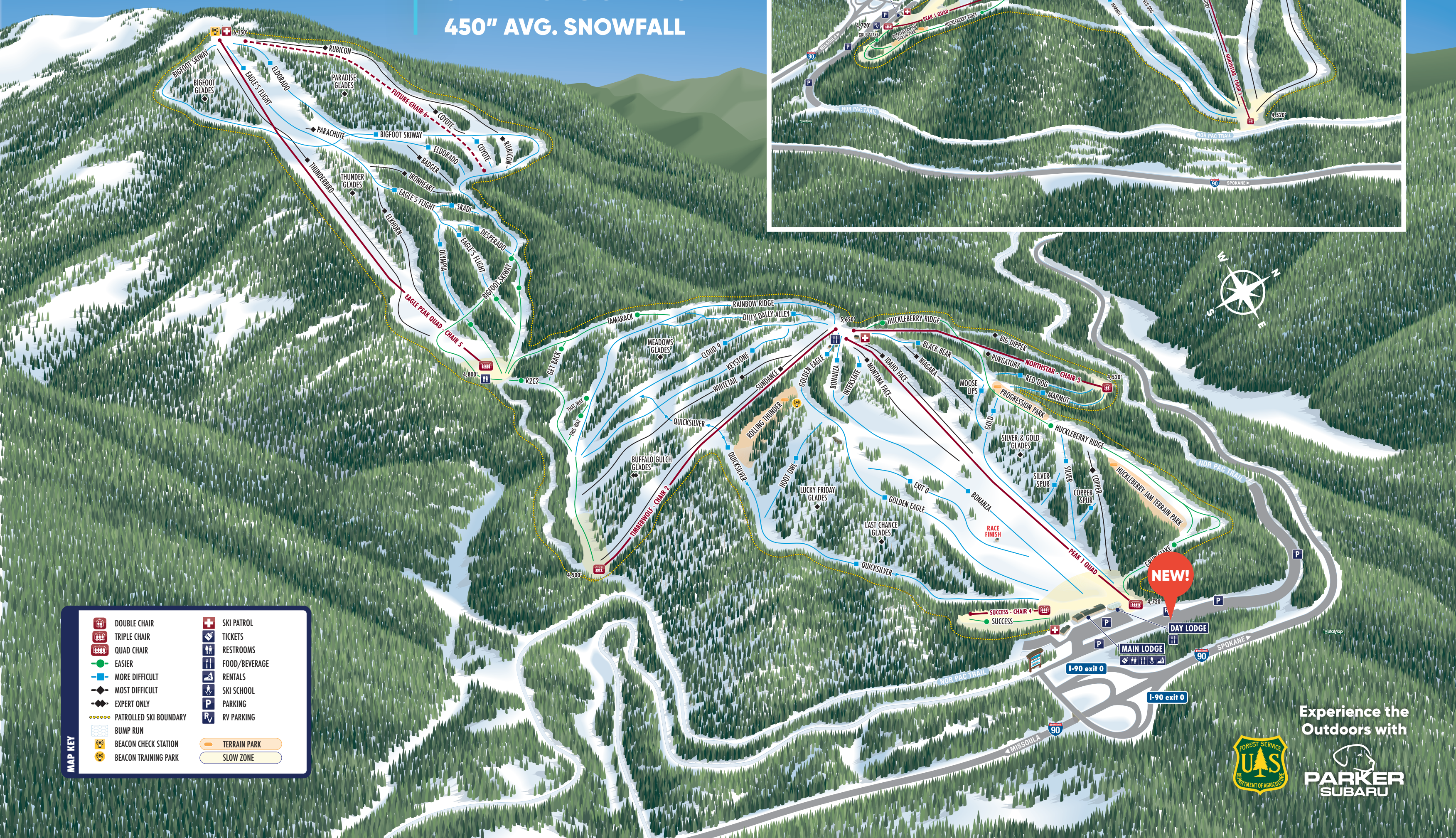
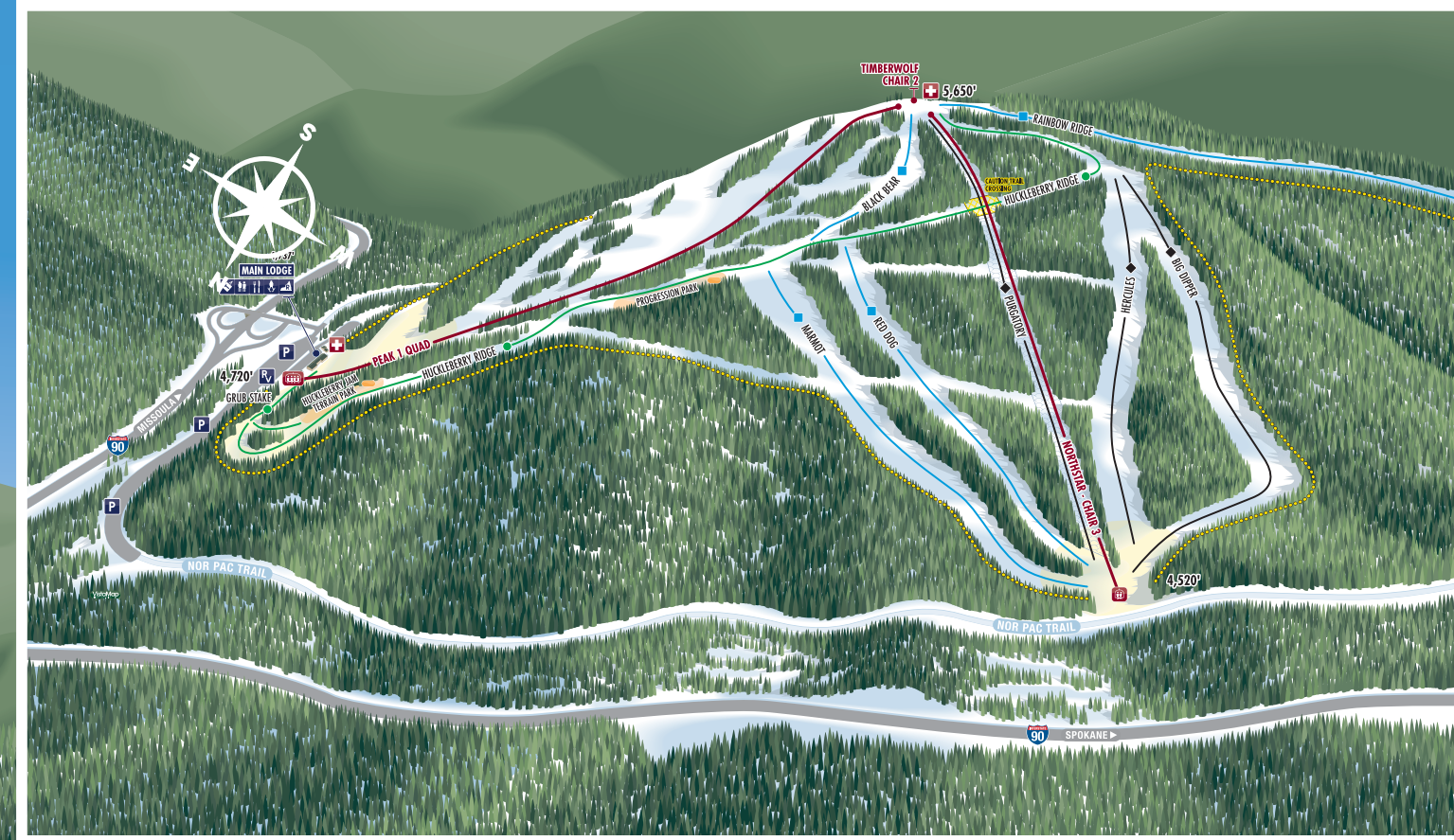
Your Responsibility Code

- 1 Always stay in control. You must be able to stop or avoid people or objects.
- 2 People ahead or downhill of you have the right-of-way. You must avoid them.
- 3 Stop only where you are visible from above and do not restrict traffic.
- 4 Look uphill and avoid others before starting downhill or entering a trail.
- 5 You must prevent runaway equipment.
- 6 Read and obey all signs, warnings and hazard markings.
- 7 Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas.
- 8 You must know how and be able to load, ride and unload lifts safely. If you need assistance, ask the lift attendant.
- 9 Do not use lifts or terrain when impaired by alcohol or drugs.
- 10 If you are involved in a collision or incident, share your contact information with each other and a ski area employee.

Know and Obey the Code. It's Your Responsibility.
If you need help understanding the Code, please ask an employee.
